Director's Report

John Hunt

It is my great joy to submit this report. Over the past year we have seen great acceleration in the number of ACC people responding to God's call for the nations. We deployed seven new Field Workers in 2022 and responded to many new enquiries from people wanting to start their own journey to the field.

In 2022, we saw 464 people make decisions for Christ, through the work of our Field Workers and Partners, as well as 173 water baptisms. Our workers helped train a total of 572 leaders and planted six new churches. There have also been some changes in our organisation over the past year. Following Covid, we recognised we no longer required a physical location for our office. We have since decentralised the office and we now meet in a virtual space.



Last year, Chad Irons, who has been with us for over 12 years, felt the call to go back to the field. He has now transitioned from General Manager to being a Field Worker in Cambodia, along with his wife Corrie. Chad is now on our Board as a Field Worker representative and continues to add his experience and wisdom to the direction of our organisation.

We are also currently transitioning our overseas ACCI conference to a biennial event. In the off year we will be providing a virtual conference for our Field Workers, Partners and supporters.

I wish to thank all our staff, missionaries and partners for their incredible hard work and support over the past 12 months. We look forward to another fruitful season together.

We feel honoured to work alongside numerous exceptional Field Workers and their teams, who are achieving remarkable fruit globally.

From church planting and leadership training, to contextually relevant evangelism and a diverse range of outreach programs in their communities, our Field Workers are bringing about positive changes worldwide. Our Field Workers are now spread across Asia, Africa, Europe, the Middle East and South America, making a difference around the world.

In 2022, almost all the remaining closed borders and Covid-related restrictions were lifted, allowing our Field Workers to continue their exceptional work without having to navigate the numerous challenges that they have so effectively managed over the past three years. The PanAsia Conference was a standout moment for our team, providing an opportunity to connect with most of our Field Workers and witness their renewed energy and be encouraged by incredible testimonies.

We were also thrilled to welcome seven new Field Workers, deployed to the field in 2022. Moreover, we have 14 more Field Workers set to be deployed in the early months of 2023. We are eager to witness the impact they will make in the years to come.

2022 was another notable year for disaster relief efforts. We launched our domestic flood appeal, which allowed us to support churches in Queensland, Victoria, and particularly New South Wales, as they responded to multiple floods throughout the year. We also launched our Ukraine appeal, partnering with ACCI Field Workers and other Partners who have made significant contributions to assist those impacted by the Russian invasion in Ukraine. Lastly, we had the privilege of partnering with AOG Tonga in response to the tsunami that affected their country. We appreciate all those who continue to contribute towards our disaster appeals.

Thank you for your unwavering support of ACCI Missions, which has allowed us to make a significant impact for God around the world. We look forward to seeing all that God will do in the year to come as we serve Him in missions together.

Field Workers

Mark Kinbacher, Papua New Guinea

Mark Kinbacher has long had a heart for the people of Papua New Guinea – especially those who haven't yet heard the gospel. His involvement in the country stretches back more than 20 years and in 2009 he made it his permanent home. Along with his wife Carol and four children, the family live in a remote bush village in Buki district. While initially their ministry was fairly local – pioneering a church in their area and supporting other churches in the region – in the last five years, they've started to reach further into other regions.

"From 2018 until now, we've been focused on two particular areas – crusade-style evangelism in remote regions and helping churches that are in a deteriorating state," says Mark.



While Papua New Guinea is a largely Christian nation, there are many remote regions where people have never heard the gospel before.

"You've got to go a long way into the bush to outstretch the gospel here in PNG," Mark says. "But I'm still going into areas where no westerner's been. I'm often the first westerner, and also the first to carry a gospel message."

While other missions-based organisations organise these crusades, Mark is often invited to be the guest speaker. He regularly speaks to thousands of people who've never heard the gospel – or very little of it. Out of these crusades, new churches are formed and existing churches are re-energised.

Mark also supports churches that are experiencing difficulty. He'll often spend several months with a church, taking God's lead on ways to support and encourage the leadership and the congregation.

"It seems that God sends me on speciality tasks – into difficult areas that are facing some challenges. It could be that the environment is difficult or the church situation is difficult," reflects Mark.

"We've had some quite dramatic turnarounds in churches and whole regions, where – after our coming – people have started coming to Christ in their hundreds!"

Stories from the field CHURCH PLANTING

Sergio and Siobhan Reinhard, Uruguay

Sergio and Siobhan Reinhard have a passion for South America. And not just for one specific country – "God gave us a continent, not just a country to be working with!" says Sergio. After several years ministering in Argentina, then two years back in Australia, due to Covid, the couple and their two children now live in Uruguay – one of the least evangelised countries in South America. When they arrived in 2022, they were open to ministering in whatever way God led them. They quickly

discovered a community of expats in need of a church and a community to belong to.

"We didn't realise there was a community of expats – from America, Canada, South Africa," says Sergio. "They were coming here as a result of Covid – looking for a change of life. Most of them were not going to Spanish churches because of the language barrier.

"When we started looking for a local church for ourselves, we couldn't find anything in English. Out of that, we saw this need and felt stirred to start this church.

"We didn't come to South America to reach English-speaking people, but right now that's what is before us." This approach was no surprise to the couple's Australian church pastor who soon offered to make the new church a campus of their Canberra-based home church.

"Our pastor told me, 'Before you left Australia, I felt God put on my heart to launch a church there, affiliated with ours'," Sergio explains.

"Now we have planted a campus of this ACC church in Canberra, here in Uruguay."

The couple's long-term vision is to transition their church to a bilingual church. As well as making the church inclusive to all cultures, they believe it will grow their English-speaking attendees' knowledge of Spanish and help them assimilate into the culture of Uruguay.

"We want to open the door for Uruguayan culture to come into the church," Sergio says.



LEADERSHIP TRAINING

Pedro and Guida Caetano, Mozambique

Pedro and Guida lead the Hope Ministry Training Program out of Beira, in Mozambique. Having graduated from the program themselves over 20 years ago, they well understand the benefits of proper ministry training. "There is a real need for training in our country," reflects Pedro. "Mozambique didn't have a lot of Bible colleges in the past. We had more than 15 years of war and we are still an emerging country. "When missionaries used to come, they'd teach people but it would only be for three or four months. We have a whole generation of pastors who didn't have an opportunity for Bible college."

While the Hope Ministry Training Program used to offer live-in training, it has since transitioned to offering daytime and evening sessions only.



This allows the program to run on a smaller budget and means students don't have to live away from their families while studying.

"A lot of pastors are working and planting a church," says Pedro. "They don't have time to leave everything and come to college. They have a family to support." The college now mostly attracts people who are already pastors, as well as emerging leaders.

"Whatever they learn, they're going to be able to use it on Sunday," Pedro reflects.

As well as providing sound theological training, the course enables people to gain a diploma – which is a government requirement for all pastors wanting to register their churches.

"It's a need in our nation," says Pedro. "We are also the only Bible college with bilingual capability – we use both English and Portuguese."

In 2022, a total of 32 students studied in the Hope Ministry Training Program, hailing from all over Beira – and surrounds – and representing 17 different denominations.

Over the course of their training – which usually lasts two years – they learn about theology, leadership, conflict management and administration.

Once these leaders have completed their course, they'll join the ranks of Hope alumni who are now teaching and reaching people throughout Mozambique and surrounding nations.

"A lot of our alumni are really high-profile pastors, or are planting churches," says Pedro. "Some are working outside of Mozambique and some are involved in missions organisations. There's a lot happening!" ACCIM ANNUAL REPORT 2022

In 2022, ACCI launched Project 22, a new way for churches to partners with missionaries and projects around the world.

Project 22, which replaces 1Day, allows churches to sponsor specific projects and activities at any time throughout the year and importantly, to build relationships with those teams and individuals. Each activity is implemented by an ACCI Field Worker or Project Partner as part of their long-term strategy to see whole of life change in the communities where they work.

The beauty of Project 22 is it doesn't have to be a large project – it can be a simple need that might only require the funding of a few people to succeed.

For example, in Cambodia, Ben and Theeda Prevost are working to make disciples and plant churches. Their focus is on the next generation of leaders, so they work with many young adults.

In 2022, two young people in their team needed financial support to pay for their driver's licenses. Having a license would enable them to travel to surrounding villages for ministry opportunities. And as Ben adds: "Having a license doesn't just help these two, it helps the team – so we don't need to rely on one person when sending a team into a village for an outreach or church plant. It also increases their level of responsibility."

Ben and Theeda are grateful for those who donated funds to help these young people meet this very practical need. "This will help increase opportunities for them in all God has for them," Ben concludes.

Internship Amy Battocchio, Japan

Amy knows God has her on a path to full-time missions ministry. After first sensing God's calling to overseas missions when she was 15, she's now working as one of our first interns – having joined Penny Nakinishi in 2022 in Japan.

Amy now spends her days teaching English, supporting the local church, sharing the gospel, learning the Japanese language, and soaking up the experiences and culture around her.

"I'm now teaching English four days a week," Amy says. "I'd never taught English before but Penny has given me the classes that are more conversational. I'm teaching teenagers and adults, as well sharing the gospel in every class."

On Sundays, it's church and Amy helps in whatever way she can – playing piano in the band, helping serve the lunch, dropping people home afterwards and sometimes even preaching. She sees her greatest role as helping build community in the church. "I like to make people feel welcome," she says. "Japanese people are often very reserved, and I try to make everyone feel loved, seen and known. A lot of people also like to practise their English with me, which I really enjoy."



Amy has now been in Japan for six months and is amazed at how her perspective is changing the longer she's there. "Short-term mission trips are wonderful but you don't get to understand the culture or the people of a nation in two weeks," she says "You don't really understand how different the people and culture are, compared to how you were raised, until you live there. One of the phrases that has stuck with me from the training I did with ACCI before coming to Japan is, 'It's not wrong, just different'. This has really helped me to separate kingdom culture from my own culture; seeing a nation through the eyes of Jesus."

So, would she recommend an internship to others considering full-time missions work?

"Definitely! It's a great way to journey with the Holy Spirit to see if you are called to long-term missions work. On a short-term trip, most of the time you only see the good things. Everything is a new experience and it can almost feel like a holiday. "After six months you start to see the sacrifice and you start to count the cost. But you soon realise Jesus is worthy of it all!"

Leighton and Grace Gallagher, Indonesia

In July 2022, Leighton and Grace followed God's call to Indonesia. Here, Leighton shares what the first few months have been like and what's ahead on their journey as full-time missionaries. "We came to Indonesia with a vision for strengthening local churches, seeing more churches planted and reaching unreached people groups.

Since arriving, we've been partnering with a local church in Surabaya called International Christian Assembly (ICA), pastoring their Surabaya East Campus. It's a missionary led church, and operates like a hub for launching community projects and church planting activities.

This has been an incredible opportunity for grounding here; for building community and for understanding the ministry challenges and opportunities that are so different to Australia. For example, Surabaya is an ethnically and religiously diverse place, yet is highly stratified and even segregated. We're passionate about helping to mobilise local churches to look outside who they are and to reach people outside their groups. There are cultural and historical challenges associated with this, but through spending time with leaders and through regular preaching opportunities we have been able to start having those conversations in an open way. People are generally receptive to these conversations and it has been an encouraging start.



Church planting

In 12 months' time, we will move as a family to the city of Malang, to plant a new, bilingual church. This is something that the national AOG here has specifically requested, as they look for new ways to reach the younger generation. We are working through ICA to build relationships on the ground in Malang and already have a small team who feel called to be part of this.

Malang is a strategic city to plant a church – it is a university city with many young people eager to improve their English. Our church will be an Indonesian church that uses English as a way of reaching into the universities.

Our heart is not to reach people from other churches, but those who've never heard the gospel. From the onset, we want this to become a place that loves, disciples and releases leaders to plant more churches.

In 2023, we are working with our small planting team to scout out potential site locations and work through the process to register the church. Gaining community acceptance will be a big part of this. We are also beginning to fundraise for some of the upfront capital expenses necessary to plant the church, while continuing to strengthen our relationships with local Bible

colleges and churches through the AOG." ACCIM ANNUAL REPORT 2022

IMC course

Intercultural Ministry Competence course

ACCI's IMC course offers a thorough introduction to cross-cultural missions for both current and aspiring Field Workers. It's based on academic and Biblical principles, combined with our wealth of experience in the field, delivered in state-of-the-art online format.

ACCI Field Workers say the course is helping increase their effectiveness in intercultural ministry. Missions-hearted pastors and emerging leaders (who made up more than half of course participants in 2022) say it's giving them an expanded understanding of God's work in the world.

Those training to go to the field find that it's providing a practical grounding as they launch into full-time cross-cultural ministry. According to Luke and Kylie Cubis, who have just started as ACCI Field Workers in Italy:

"We learnt a lot and recommend it for anyone who's looking to go onto the mission field; equally anyone who's just interested in missions in any way," says Luke. "There are some amazing instructors and teachers in it and really practical hands-on teaching that will be invaluable for us as we go into the missions field," adds Kylie.

IMC continues to expand, now comprising almost 300 video sessions. In 2022, we scripted, filmed and launched another 20+ videos and onscreen materials. This included a set of learnings on resilience from a qualified counsellor – meeting a critical need which arose during Covid. We also delivered a series of monthly webinars to help new and existing Field Workers with their support-raising strategies; building on what they had learnt in the course.

In total, around 300 people were enrolled in, and working through, the IMC course in 2022!



Partner with ACCI and pray for the nations

We believe one of the most effective ways to reach our world is to pray. When we pray, doors open, hearts soften and strongholds break. Prayer creates room for God to move and for the work we do to have a lasting impact.

"All missions is built on a foundation of prayer," says ACCI Director John Hunt. "It doesn't matter how altruistic we are or how high our objectives are, without prayer it's all going to come to naught.

"Please join with us in praying for our workers and their families, and for God's will to be done throughout the earth."

The importance of prayer to our Field Workers

We asked four Field Workers what prayer means to them and a testimony of how prayer has made a difference in their lives or ministries. We also asked for their current prayer needs. Here's what they shared.

Russell and Jenny Barton, Uganda

"We have always valued people that commit to praying for us and our team in Uganda. When you know people are committed to praying for you, it's like a shield that goes before us protecting, providing and giving us strength and peace."

"In November 2021, we were driving across to our community centre and church on the other side of Kampala. We had for some reason decided to travel a different route and our car radio was tuned into an English-speaking station. Three suicide bombs went off just minutes apart around Kampala; we could see smoke from one of the explosions. The news on the radio advised us of the explosions; we were supposed to be driving through one of the areas that was hit. Sometimes people say that was lucky, but we know in times like that, people have been prompted to pray for us. Prayer is literally like a bulletproof vest when you're on the front line."



Current prayer needs: Protection, safety and health.

Penny Nakanishi, Japan

•

"As a church planter in a previously unchurched area in rural Japan, there is a lot of un-ploughed land. It is very hard soil. Spiritually speaking, we are working on the front lines of enemy territory. It is only through intercessory prayer that any progress can be made at all. I consider intercessory prayer the most important thing I can do. However, living in a culture for a long time it is easy to become desensitised to the spiritual realities and become blind or just accept the spiritual climate for how it is. When people outside of the culture look in, they can often see things that long-term missionaries take for granted as the norm. They can pray with fresh eyes, which is a great blessing."



When we were in the middle of our building project, we met on several occasions especially to pray that financial deadlines be met, and that we would be able to purchase Hirakawa city's first ever permanent church building. It really did seem an impossible task in front of us. We also sent out

many prayer requests for people back home to stand with us in prayer for our miracle building. God was faithful and we were able to settle the purchase of our building on Christmas Eve 2021!"

Current prayer needs: More people to commit to being baptised; for strength, stamina and rest for the team; and the church's love for Jesus to continue to grow.

Kate Green, Thailand

"Prayer support for me is the most valuable support I can receive. Honestly, I have seen so many situations of breakthrough and safety when people have prayed for me. I know without a doubt I am still here because of God's miraculous protection and the faithfulness of prayer partners."

"I work alongside the Thai/Myanmar border in Thailand. There is a civil war in Myanmar and we have many refugees who have run across the border into Thailand to seek refuge. I work alongside the local church, officials and community to deliver emergency aid. Every day, we pray before we leave the church to take aid. We've had times where we've gone to go to one area and been turned away by officials and then had to go to another area and had exactly what those people have needed in our trucks – right down to the community leader calling the last name on his list and our last pack in the truck going out to that family.



"One particular day we had planned to go to a military temporary refugee shelter to give clothes. As we were driving out, one of the ladies said she felt we needed to buy some bread roll snacks to take. We bought 1,000 and continued to the distribution centre. We drove an hour, and we're 200 metres from the distribution centre when the pastor's wife said to me, 'I feel we should stop and call our contact'. We called and she asked us to stop, reverse 150 metres and turn down the dirt track. We drove down and met our contact. She had come across 13 women, with all their children, who had run across the river that morning as the bombs were just on the other side. They hadn't eaten in three days. We were able to help these women and children, and be at the right place at the right time.

"My daily prayer is, 'God, please may my eyes see what You want me to see, my ears hear what You want me to hear and my heart be obedient to all that You call me to."

Current prayer needs: For refugees and those internally displaced by Myanmar's civil war; that Kate and her team would continue to find ways to bring hope and joy to those who have faced trauma; and for team members – that they would not grow weary in doing good and continue to walk in God's grace.

Alison Atkinson, Sri Lanka

"The prayer support of the Church is invaluable to us! In Mark 16:15, Jesus tells us to 'Go into all the world and preach the gospel to all creation'. Prayer connects the missions of the world and the Church together so in partnership we can reach out and preach the gospel to all of creation. Through prayer, the Church gets closer to God's heart for the world and is more aware of what is happening in the nations. Prayer definitely makes a difference!"



Recently I had to face the unknown journey of cancer. In September 2022, I was operated on for thyroid cancer. The fear that comes with this journey was overwhelming and literally crippled every part of my life. I believe it was the prayers of many that carried me through this time and gave me a wonderful sense of peace during this life-threatening storm. Today, I have recovered and received the best report from my doctor, but I know it was the prayers of many that opened up the doors of heaven and God has healed me and blessed me! Grateful!"

Current prayer needs: The people of Sri Lanka, as the nation faces a devastating economic crisis; protection, good health and supernatural provision for team members; greater impact through projects in 2023; and for churches in Sri Lanka to become a loud voice of hope throughout the nation.

Disasters

In 2022, ACCI raised funds for two disaster responses: the Ukraine emergency and the VIC/NSW/QLD floods.

Ukraine appeal

With the support of generous Australian donors, we raised almost \$290,000 to help our Field Workers and Partners provide practical and emotional support for those affected by the war in Ukraine. Most Partners ran localised small scale, but effective, responses, either supporting internally displaced people (IDPs) or refugees. Abolishion provided human trafficking awareness across the wider region.

From our Field Workers:

Eli and Eliseo Saltaleggio, Romania

"Funds were used to pay for multiple trips into Ukraine, with a loaded van full of food and hygiene products. These were distributed to multiple churches and refugee camps in Ukraine which are actively aiding IDPs. We also bought two fridges and a split system air conditioning unit for a church in Ukraine that is housing IDPs.

"The churches in Ukraine are doing such an amazing job; many are providing people with a place to sleep, food, hot showers and spiritual and moral support. Of course, they don't always have enough funds to cover these growing and ongoing costs. So, to receive these donations was such a blessing. It means they can continue to receive IDPs and not have to turn them away."





Disasters

Leanne Rhodes, Abolishion, Europe

"We were at all the borders within five days – Moldova, Romania, Slovakia, Hungary and Poland, warning people about traffickers and how to stay safe. We had social media going out in 11 different languages. We also ran webinars for churches on trauma informed care, psychosocial first aid, self-care and vicarious trauma, and conflict-related sexual violence.

"A year on and we haven't seen the reports of trafficking that we would have expected to see by now. That doesn't mean we can say we did that, but we certainly contributed."



Flood appeal

Churches and individuals throughout Australia gave just over \$300,000 to help people affected by the floods that took place during 2022. We distributed funds to churches in affected areas and to Chaplaincy Australia. Churches used funds to provide a range of support to their communities, including food, toiletries, appliances and cash grants. Some churches also offered wellbeing programs within schools, and other family support as required. Chaplaincy Australia used its funding to send chaplains into affected areas, particularly evacuation centres, to help people deal with the emotional toll of the disaster.

Funds were also provided to help pastors clean out and repair their own properties, as well as to an organisation providing stockfeed for farmers. Tony Meston, who is the pastor of Generation Go! in Lismore, NSW, says the February 2022 floods were the biggest on record and destroyed almost half of the homes in town and most of the businesses. Outlying farms and properties were also significantly affected.



"People had to start rebuilding their lives; a lot of them can't get insurance so there was no coverage," Tony says. "We were going out and cleaning out places with funds that came in. We also gave out \$2,500 cash grants straight to vulnerable families who we knew through our church or in the wider community. They were able to use this to help with buying a replacement car, or tools for work. For others, it helped them buy a fridge or washing machine. "These grants were life altering for people. They could actually feel the tangible effects of people's love and prayers. Thank you to ACCI and to everyone who sowed in to make that happen."



Inspiration from PanAsia

PanAsia 2022 was a great reunion of pastors, leaders and Field Workers, who gathered in Phuket for the first inperson PanAsia conference since 2019.

"PanAsia was a wonderful time for all those who attended. It was obvious that the three-year forced hiatus thanks to Covid had left everybody hungry for fellowship and thankful for the privilege of being together. Stories of faith culminating in souls saved and lives changed were inspiring, and the ministry by our movement's leaders was world class."
